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### WORKING TOGETHER TO REDUCE WILDFIRE RISK

### 5 HOA and Community Meetings

WRWC presentations at meetings and local events help landowners generally understand wildfire risk and the programs WRWC offers to help them reduce their wildfire risks.



WRWC's free Site Visit Program helps landowners understand their specific wildfire risk and ways to reduce their risk by improving access, home hardening, and fuels reduction.

## 56 Cost-Share Projects

WRWC's Cost-Share Program helps landowners reduce their risk by providing technical assistance and financial incentives to reduce vegetation. WRWC and Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS) specialists lay out mitigation projects based on statewide and national standards. WRWC reimburses program participants up to 75% of eligible costs once their project has met the standards and specifications in the project Scope of Work (SOW).

### 10 Project Showcases for Contractors

WRWC and CSFS host multi-project 'showcases' to connect the forestry contractors with participating landowners and let the contractors view the projects before submitting bids to the landowners. Showcases foster competitive bidding and maximize efficiency for contractors and staff.

### 1 Contractor Workshop

WRWC and CSFS hosted a workshop for 35 contractors to help them understand the bidding process and what is required in CSFS standards for wildfire mitigation.

### 5 West Region Wildfire Council Meetings

The West Region Wildfire Council meets bi-monthly to share updates and host speakers. WRWC 2018 Year in Review; Tim Mathewson, 2019 Seasonal Fire Weather Outlook; Chris Rodriguez, After the Spring Fire in Constilla County, CO; Jamie Gomez, Ouray County Wildfire Mitigation Land Use Code; Eric Brantingham, GMUG Fuels Projects Highlights and Planning; Sam Pankratz, Forest Health Review

### 1 County Land Use Code Section Revised

Over nearly 3 years, WRWC assisted with reviewing the Wildfire Mitigation Section of the Ouray County Land Use Code and developing a comprehensive suite of recommended updates and revisions, which were adopted by the county in 2019.

### 8 Registered Chipping Communities / 236 Chipping Participants

Through the Chipping Program, WRWC allows residents within registered communities to chip up to 5 large piles of slash for free to help reduce their wildfire risk around their home. Piles are chipped by a contractor hired by WRWC.

### 460 Cost-Share Acres Treated/78 Homes Benefitted

We are making a dent in wildfire risk with defensible space and fuel mitigation! Through the WRWC Cost-Share Program, hundreds of acres were mitigated in defensible space and landscape-level fuel reduction projects across WRWC's six-county region. As more homes and communities within the 'west region' of Colorado are better mitigated from the risks posed by futures wildfires, they become better adapted to living in wildfire prone ecosystems.
